Amy will explain the history and objectives of Black Lives Matter and how we can be good allies to the movement.

Before the meeting day, you will receive an emailed Invitation. The hyperlink will allow you to join the meeting.

On the day of the meeting click the hyperlink.

If for some reason the link does not work, you can access Zoom and click *Join a Meeting*. You can then enter the unique Meeting ID and the Passcode provided on the Invitation.

If you are joining via telephone, you will need the teleconferencing number provided in the Invitation.

Don't forget to click *permit audio and video* when prompted.

The host will let you in the meeting.

During the presentation your audio will be muted, but the Chat feature will allow you to send AAUW CC Host a message if you have a question, concern and/or epiphany.

I would be happy to conduct a practice meeting with anyone who wishes to try it out before the meeting.

Writers



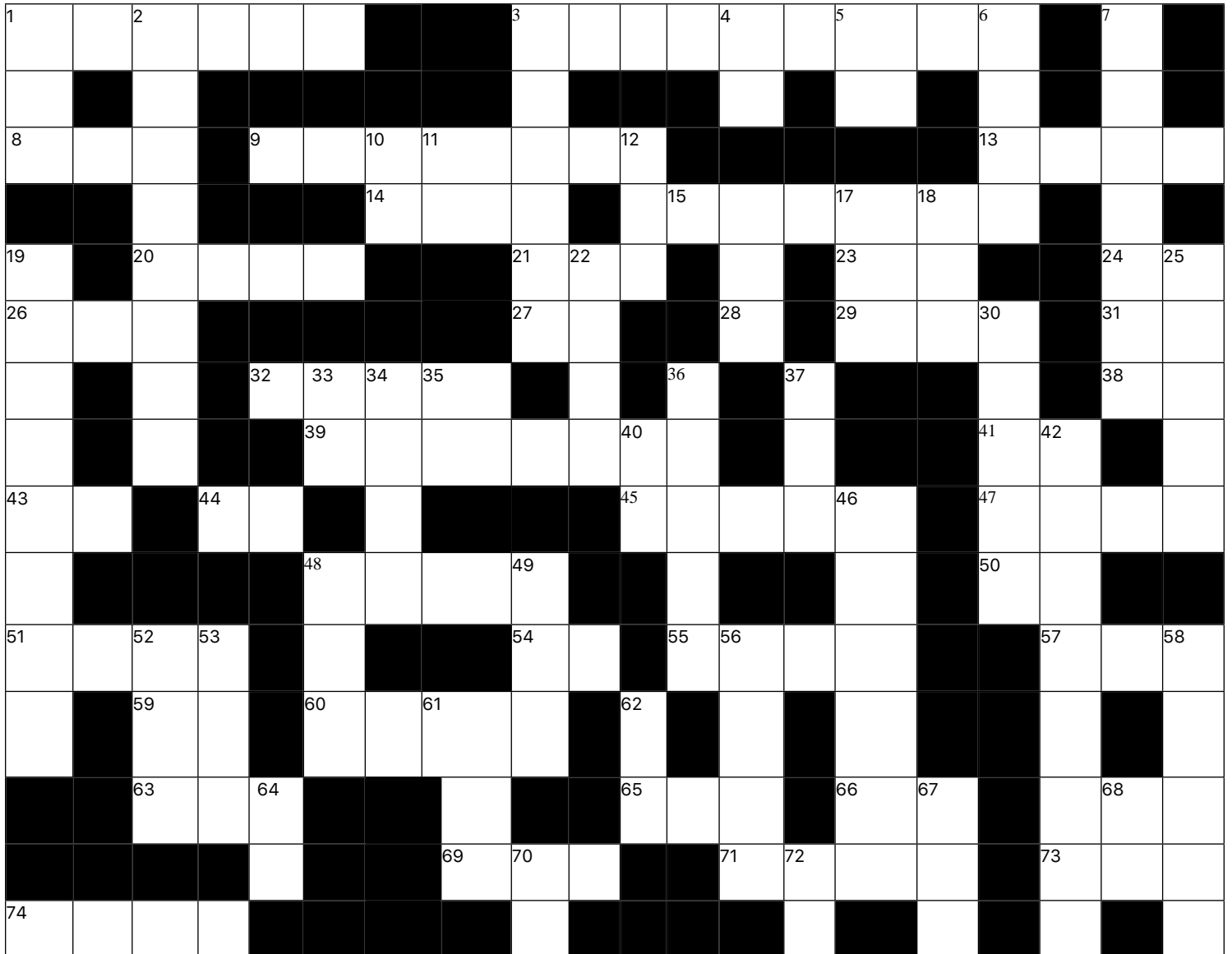
