

One of our assignments this month was to tell about a real historical event and how it impacted our lives. Below is Dottie Ewing's contribution and we encouraged her to share with our members.



After my second child was born, I wanted very much to be an at-home mom. We couldn't afford for me not to have an income. As most young couples find, one income doesn't always suffice. So, I started a secretarial service, working out of my house. All I had was a manual portable typewriter, but it was adequate to get started. After I had built up a sufficient customer and income base, I went searching for an electric typewriter. I found a new one in an office supply place, but I didn't have enough money to pay cash for it. I went to the bank to take out a loan. No biggie--good credit, reasonable source of income, etc. I definitely qualified for the loan.

The bank officer and I went through all the paper work and I was getting ready to sign the agreement when the banker says, "Of course, your husband will have to come in and sign the papers before we can give you the money." I was stunned. My immediate response was, "My husband is not going to pay for this; I am!" His response, "Sorry, we have to have his signature."

I can't really describe how angry I was. I had been earning my own living since I was 17 years old. And have a stuffed shirt tell me my husband would have to sign that before I could get the money! (In fairness to the banker, he knew that was the law; I didn't.) I stood up and said, "In that case, no thank you." It wasn't that I was concerned about my husband signing; I knew he would. It was that I could not legally take out a loan in my own name without my husband's signature.


I went back to my manual typewriter, saved some more money, and paid cash for a secondhand electric typewriter I found advertised in the newspaper.

It would be a few years before Ruth Bader Ginsburg started making inroads on the restrictions law and society placed on married women. And at that time, I was so busy being a working wife and mother I didn't even notice. But I am grateful to her and others like her who led the way. Thank you, RBG.






WINE & CHEESE
