## President's Message - Shirley Selz

Events keep us busy and engaged despite COVID restrictions. Two major events – a change of leadership in Washington occurred on January 20 and Audrey Jones' 100<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration on February 1. The latter may garner less national press coverage but is very significant to us. Please see the article about Audrey elsewhere in this newsletter.

The board of directors met on January 16, and I am happy to report that committees and interest groups are busily planning and pursuing their missions. Despite inability to conduct our traditional book sales at Neyland Library, Debbie Wilkins and Kris Conlan keep our book sales on ebay quite active to generate revenue for the Branch and enhancing contact with informed readers. Thus, Branch finances continue to remain strong.

Sylvia Rendon explained the need for a change in speaker for our February meeting. February is when the Branch awards the Sue Stanford Scholarship of \$1,500 to a Texan A&M student. Generally the prior year's scholarship winner is scheduled to present a program at the February meeting to inform the members of her research and plans. However, the 2020 winner is not available and Sylvia has scheduled a substitute speaker for next month. The board discussed the timing problem of expecting a scholarship winner in February 2021 of being available to present a program in February 2022; i.e. during the year after receiving a scholarship, the winner may complete her studies, take a job in another location, or for many other reasons be unable to commit to make a presentation a year in advance. It was decided to ask the scholarship winner to inform us in writing of her research findings or other accomplishments rather than commit to a future program.

Catherine Cox reported on new members joining AAUW. Even during these months of having virtual rather than in-person meetings, Catherine has been successful in keeping our membership growing and enthusiastic. Thank you Catherine and welcome all new members!

## AUDREY BEYER JONES – CENTURY MILESTONE by Shirley Selz

Receiving her Quilt of Valor

**February 1, 1921** – who could have predicted that Audrey Beyer, born in Madison, Wisconsin, would celebrate her **100<sup>th</sup> birthday** in Corpus Christi, with well wishes from countless friends and family. Her AAUW family enthusiastically joins in a rousing **HAPPY BIRTHDAY**, and reflects on her journey that mirrors AAUW's mission.

When Audrey graduated from Milwaukee-Downer College in 1941, STEM had not entered the language as an acronym, but she could have been the poster girl for STEM, having majored in Foods and Nutrition and Chemistry. While jobs for young women at that time were mostly limited to secretarial, nursing, and teaching, Audrey headed to Christmas Island off the coast of Maine to work for the summer with her chemistry professor, followed an internship at Colorado General Hospital in Denver. Then she was off to New Orleans to work at Charity Hospital, while living in the French Quarter with its restaurants, beignets, and exciting life.

Fun times gave way to serious duty as World War II raged. The army needed hospital dietitians and Audrey rose to the occasion by enlisting. She reported to the 12<sup>th</sup>

Evacuation Hospital in England which, at the time, had been located in Wales but had been moved to southern England where it operated as a 750 bed tent hospital ready for D-Day. On June 5, 1944, an armada of planes began flying over her location, continuing for hours as the invasion of June 6 was beginning. Audrey crossed the channel on July 31 where her group anchored at Utah Beach, one of the prime invasion locations by that time liberated from the Nazi Army. Imagine riding inland in trucks where they were cheered by the liberated French, and then following the Third Army, sometimes taking over a hospital or barracks or tents in cities in France, Luxembourg, and Germany. Morale was surely boosted by visits from Generals Eisenhower and Patton, and also by Bob Hope and Bing Crosby. The war finally ended in May, 1945, and Audrey completed her Army career on December 28, 1945. The term "Greatest Generation" had not yet been coined by Tom Brokaw, but Audrey is surely one of the greatest of those who lived through the great depression, served in World War II, established careers and families while incorporating the work ethic, frugality, sacrifice, and honor forged through dedication and experiences.

The G.I. Bill supported Audrey's further education as she returned to Wisconsin and earned a B.A. with a major in English. Later, she earned a teaching certificate at the University of Corpus Christi (prior to its becoming A&M Corpus Christi). Between those educational endeavors, she worked at the V.A. Hospital in Wood, Wisconsin; as Chief Dietitian at Kuakini Hospital in Honolulu; married Frank Jones; and moved to Corpus Christi. She became mother to three sons and cherishes her extended family. Her travels include Europe, China, Australia, and New Zealand.

Audrey is also a cherished member of her AAUW family. In recent years she served as Friendship Chairman and volunteered for years with Book Finders. We especially recognize her service to the Branch as President in 1994-96. Audrey is a role model whose experiences should be shared not only with our members, but also with others the Branch reaches through its Community Outreach and STEM projects and its interest groups. In particular, the YWTeens, Miller High School Girls, and West Oso Junior High School STEM students can learn so much and become motivated by our beloved Audrey's intellectual excellence, scientific and administrative achievements, dedicated service, good humor, family love, and great friendship. Audrey – you are a real treasure and we are privileged to know you.
