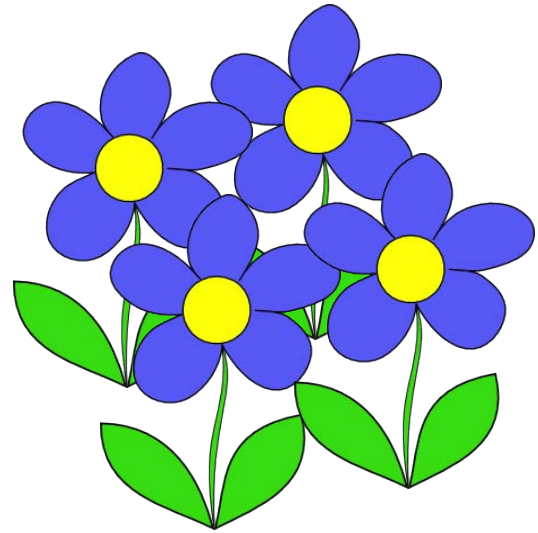

The speaker for the event will be Sofia Jimenez, who is the President of the Del Mar AAUW Student Chapter.

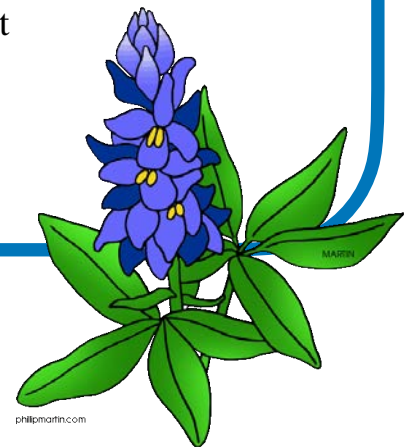
Other projects we are working on include:

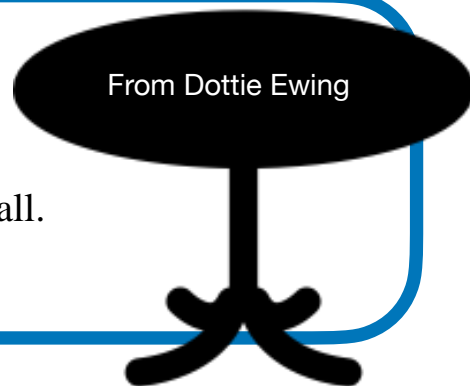
Thursday, April 21, Alan Bereka, 2017 Corpus Christi Poet Laureate, presented his poetry to our group at the Neyland Library.

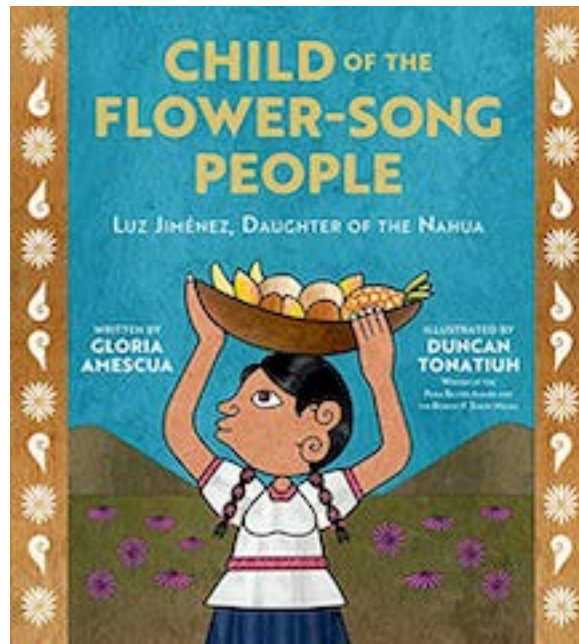


left to right: Michelle Balis, Deenie Tillman, Annie Huckabee, and Kay West. Seated poet: Alan Berecka

Gloria Amescua, a Latina and Tejana writer from Austin, Texas, captivated and delighted an audience as she read from her recent picture book biography, **CHILD OF THE FLOWER-SONG PEOPLE: LUZ JIMÉNEZ, DAUGHTER OF THE NAHUA**, illustrated by Duncan Tonatiuh.

Sylvia Rendon and Diana Cardenas were part of a unique university event, Authors Day, and an audience of local book lovers, undergraduate and graduate students, and professors at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi on Thursday, April 21.

Ms. Amescua (surname is Basque) explained the origin of her passion for Luz Jimenez and the extensive, engaging, and surprising research into this native daughter of an ancient people and the immense process of planning a picture book. Jimenez, who longed to be educated after migrating to Mexico City with village members after the Mexican Revolution, grew up to assist anthropologists and linguists who studied Nahua history and language and worked as a model for painters who captured her Nahua face.

Ms. Amescua departed after generous applause from her audience to rest for the next day's activity: an extensive workshop with over 100 excited high school student writers from 5 area high schools who traveled to the university to spend the day drafting, sharing their creations with Ms. Amescua and other students, enjoying lunch, and revisiting their compositions, poetry or prose. Students had already received and read the picture book at their high schools before participating in the workshop.

On Saturday Ms. Amescua presented sections of her book to area English and Language Arts teachers and university English professors as part of the Coastal Bend Writing Project. Also, she analyzed cultural and historical elements of the book.

Many individuals benefitted from Amescua's generous spirit of sharing and her gift of authorship.



AAUW of Texas Conference

On April 30, 2022, AAUW Texas held its 50th state conference by Zoom, and all members were invited to attend, free of charge. The conference was titled “Celebrating our Commitment to Providing a Golden Opportunity for Women and Girls.”

The first speaker was Jackie Littleton, a North Texas author and member of AAUW Texas. Jackie told stories that will be in her soon-to-be-published book, “The Lady and the Letters.” Jackie recently served on an Archives Task Force that had her searching through multiple file boxes of historical records for national AAUW, and she emphasized how important it is to maintain and provide access to our organization’s historical records. [Side note: Our Branch has already proactively followed this advice with an Archives committee established in 2021-22.] Jackie’s stories included women with degrees who were desperate to escape Nazi-occupied Europe during World War II and who sought help from AAUW. These stories led to mentioning how some AAUW Branches engage in an international focus.

The second speaker was Kevin Stewart, our Texas Legislative Consultant. Kevin gave an overview of the Texas Legislative processes and timelines. The 2021 session was significantly impacted by the February winter storm, which led to fewer bills getting passed. The legislative agenda items considered important for AAUW Texas were (1) workforce issues, including workplace protections, job training, family leave, and childcare; (2) healthcare issue, including access to care, behavioral health, and healthcare disparities; and (3) criminal justice issues, including sexual assault and human trafficking. Legislation successfully passed included: extending postpartum Medicaid coverage for six months; requiring insurers to cover screening for detection of ovarian cancer; prohibiting polygraphing sexual assault victims; and others. Kevin mentioned that the coming 88th Legislative Session is predicted to be more polarized because several representatives considered to be from the “middle” are retiring out. During Q&A, Kevin answered questions about the “heartbeat” bill, saying that the last session did not include much opportunity for public testimony on this issue or others. Kevin encouraged AAUW members to start talking to current political candidates about issues important to us, getting involved early and often.

After lunch, a “Celebrating AAUW Texas” agenda item included presentations and awards to various members across the state. The next state newsletter will have details on the awards.

Malinda Gaul, AAUW Board of Directors Vice Chair, gave an update from national AAUW. As most know, AAUW has been working to bring the national database into the current century. The system should be working as of today, allowing members to individually access the Community Hub to update their annual membership. More details will be coming soon. Malinda mentioned a new STEM for Girls national program created and supported by a recent large donation received by AAUW. This program will include a series of virtual workshops during the summer months for girls in middle and high school. AAUW has also continue to update annually its Equal Pay Day report and to support the Equal Pay Day events. In addition, AAUW invites hundreds of college women to attend a virtual leadership training program at their National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) scheduled for May 24-26.

Raegan Pebley, TCU Women’s Basketball head coach, made a presentation on the history of AAUW and Title IX. Raegan reminded us that we are embarking on the 50th anniversary of Title IX. In 1972, only one in 72 college women had participated in any collegiate sport; now that number is one in five. To emphasize the impact of sports participation, Raegan stated that while only 6% of CEOs at Fortune 500 companies are women, more than 90% of those female CEOs participated in collegiate sports. She expressed concern about how Title IX will be protected in the future, since NCAA decisionmakers are primarily men, with few women – and fewer women of color – included. Recent gender disparities were noted in COVID testing, travel housing accommodations, salaries, and other factors.

Our last speaker was Dr. Taharee Jackson, a consultant who talked about allyship, urgency, and solidarity in the struggle for equity and social justice. She noted that these past three years have been disproportionately difficult for women. Violence against women and girls increased during COVID isolation. Additionally, two thirds of student loan debt is held by women. Dr. Jackson described her own schooling experience and the difficulty in being a sole female as well as a sole black student in STEM classes. She stressed that we need to get others to recognize sexism at the institutional/structural and cultural level, which is based on pervasive sociohistorical factors. She ended with a discussion of Jonathan Osler’s [actors, allies, and accomplices framework](#).

During breaks throughout the day, slides were shown from Texas Branches, featuring activities, programs, scholarship awards, and interest groups. The photos were an inspiring show of the multitude and variety of worthy projects sponsored by AAUW Branches throughout the state. Kudos to our Branch officers Sylvia Rendon and Susan Birchfield who gathered, assimilated, labeled, and submitted great photos from our Corpus Christi Branch that were included in slide show!
