## President's Message

Dear AAUW Members,

My heart is heavy for our nation on this 4<sup>th</sup> of July. The mass killing of seven people and injuring of dozens of others while celebrating our nation's birthday raises the specter of so many other shootings and psychic injuries that we face as a country. One of the most resent upheavals for women is the U.S. Supreme Court's overturning of *Roe v. Wade*.

No matter where you stand on the issue of when life begins, one cannot deny the confusion, fear, and loss of dignity that many women feel due to the decision. I am most troubled by the absoluteness and cruelty of some of the state laws that will now go into effect—no exception for incest, no exception for rape, no consideration of the danger to the woman's physical or mental health in carrying a fetus that may not live or may be severely deformed, bounty hunting (a novel Texas law) to help punish desperate women who try to have abortions in other states. Public conversations suggest that some states, taking their cue from the high court, may go a step further and prohibit long-accepted measures of birth control.

Women of color will, as usual, suffer most from these laws, their rates of poverty being higher and opportunities for insurance, healthy foods and exercise, and pre-natal and post-natal care less. Mortality rates in the United States have risen overall in the last 20 years. The statistics for Black women, however, are particularly alarming. In 2020, maternal mortality for Blacks was 2.5 times higher than for whites. For those with college degrees the rate was much higher. Blacks were five times more likely to die in pregnancy, giving birth, or within the first year of giving birth (<https://www.commonwealthfund.org/publications/issue-brief-report/2020/dec/maternal-mortality-united-states-primer>). (There is much for us to learn on this issue!) The overturning of *Roe* will, no doubt, increase these problems. "The arc of history" that Martin Luther King, Jr., saw as "bend[ing] towards justice" seems at this moment to be straightening or even turning the other way.

This is a time when AAUW is most needed. Girls and women need to know that they are valued and that they can succeed. Our national organization has taken a strong stand on the cause for women's bodily autonomy:

*AAUW believes everyone has the right to make decisions about their own reproductive lives without government interference. Abortion access is vital to women's ability to control their lives, bodies, and futures. Without reproductive freedom, there can be no equity.*

If you choose to join a protest objecting to the U.S. Supreme Court's opinion on *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* or pressing for the codification of *Roe v. Wade* into law, wearing your AAUW T-shirt is clearly appropriate. We will be adding to our program list to give us more information about the changing landscape for women's reproductive rights.

Through AAUW, we strive to equal the playing field for women and girls through "education, research, and advocacy." May we find strength and determination to continue to do those things that we have always done best. Thank you, Book Finders! Thank you, Community Outreach! Thank you STEM! Thank you, Communications! And thank you, members all, who stand up for women and girls directly and indirectly in all that you do!

I regret that I could not send you a more upbeat greeting, this being my first "Message" as Branch President. These are unusual times, and my heart compelled me to speak on the issue that is on everyone's mind. My hope continues, despite great personal disappointment in our Court and in our Congress, that the "arc of history" will ultimately return to its rightful course—towards justice—and this includes equality for women in every way.

# Scholarships – DIRECT AND ENDOWED

Encouraging women scholars – not only highly valued but actively supported through direct and endowed grants, the Corpus Christi Branch financially assists undergraduate and graduate students at Texas A&M - Corpus Christi and at Del Mar College. Profits generated by Book Finders from used book sales provides the funds for three annual direct scholarships and for establishment of two endowed funds. The Branch currently budgets \$2,500 for direct scholarships. Revenue from book sales has been sufficient to meet the budgeted amount. Separately, earnings from a long established endowed fund at AAUW, Inc., are combined with earnings of other similar endowments for scholarships and community action projects awarded by AAUW, Inc.

1. **Direct Scholarship – Texas A & M – Corpus Christi:** The Sue Stanford Scholarship is awarded by the Branch to a history student at Texas A&M University – Corpus Christi. The amount of \$1,500 was awarded to Laura Lamb at the April 2022 meeting.
2. **Direct Scholarships – Del Mar College:** An updated agreement was signed in April 2021 between the Del Mar College Foundation and the Branch. The target award is \$500 per student who is selected by the DMC Foundation. The Foundation cannot legally restrict the award to a female student but agreed to give preference to a member of the Del Mar College student organization of AAUW. Although the student group is not restricted to women students, the number of men students, if any, is anticipated to be very few compared to the number of women students. Because the Branch donated \$1,000, the donation provided funds for two scholarships. This year \$500 was awarded to Samantha Luna and to Hope Clark.
3. **Endowed Scholarship at Texas A&M – Corpus Christi:** An agreement executed in 2021 between the Branch and Texas A&M – Corpus Christi Foundation created the “AAUW Corpus Christi Branch Endowed Scholarship.” It was funded with \$12,000, which was part of the proceeds of a redeemed certificate of deposit. Additions to the principal can be made at any time. The Foundation was able to legally limit eligibility to a female student. No award will be made for at least a year to allow time for the invested funds to earn interest. A minimum award is anticipated to be \$500.00.
4. **Endowed Scholarship at Del Mar College:** An agreement executed in August 2021 between the Branch and Del Mar College Foundation created the “American Association of University Women Endowed Scholarship.” It was funded with \$10,000, which was part of the proceeds of a redeemed certificate of deposit. Additions to the principal can be made at any time. Similar to the direct scholarship, preference is given for a student member of AAUW’s student organization at Del Mar College. Earnings must be adequate to provide a scholarship of at least \$500 before an award is made.
5. **Corpus Christi Research and Projects Endowment a/k/a AAUW Fund 1431 – Corpus Christi Branch:** Funds donated to AAUW, Inc., prior to 1994 constitute an endowed fund invested by AAUW, Inc. The earnings provide part of the funds for scholarships and other grants by AAUW, Inc.



## MYSTERY OF A BRANCH ENDOWMENT

The Corpus Christi Branch of AAUW advances its mission through local and national means to support gender equity for women and girls through research, education and advocacy. This is the story of one of those mission initiatives – establishing a specific endowment within AAUW's national investment and grant program.

Branch History in Accomplishments as printed in yearbooks first mentions raising money for the Education Foundation in 1940-46; then mentioned again for 1949, 1957, 1990, 1991, 1998-99, 2009, and 2010, but not thereafter. We knew that two prior funds established by the branch with AAUW had been consolidated in 1990 and that the combined fund had been completed in 1994 with total contributions of \$35,000. Recently, however, the fund itself seemed all but erased from institutional memory. Efforts were made in the summer of 2020 to learn more about the fund – does it still exist; is it identified as created by Corpus Christi; is it available for grant requests; are there restrictions; what are the criteria for grants, etc. None of the Branch past presidents could provide any information, and an inquiry to the national office did not produce any response. Due to the uncertainty about the fund, we decided not to include it in the 2021-22 yearbook unless enough information was obtained prior to publication to better describe it to Branch members. No such information was obtained.

Efforts were renewed in April 2022. A breakthrough occurred on May 25 when Gloria Long, President of AAUW Texas, assisted in the research. We learned the fund is identified by AAUW, Inc., as Fund 1431. We also learned that Fund 1431 is one of 17 separate funds, the earnings of which are combined and utilized to support AAUW grants. We now have the names of the grant recipients from 2004-05 to 2021-22. Of the 18 grantees, 15 received Career Development grants, and the other 3 received Community Action grants. The recipients of 12 Career Development grants studied at Texas universities; the others at Wake Forest, Harvard, and Case Western Reserve. The three Community Action grants were for projects in San Antonio, Grand Prairie, and Austin. We do not yet know the amount of each grant or have information about the success of recipients. If and when more information is obtained, we will inform Branch members. We are now confident that the donations to Fund 1431 have been, and continue to be, very important to women individually and to society in general as the grants enabled recipients to pursue their careers and passions. We will once again include information about the fund in the yearbook, now that we understand more about its creation and utilization.

## 2022 YWTeen Summer Camp Leadership Program

During summer 2022, AAUW Corpus Christi Branch members continue to volunteer with the YWTeen summer camp leadership program at our local YWCA. Branch member Dr. Diana Cardenas led a summer camp session with 11 YWTeen participants who addressed the questions “What is America?” and “Who is an American?” Five teams and a project manager generated categories — geography, people, climate, rights — to organize ideas which were displayed on posters.

Two teens, sisters, told the group about being Americans who were born and reared on the King Ranch. Their great-grandfather emigrated from Mexico to work and live at the King Ranch. The sisters expressed pride in their families, the ranch, Texas, and the US.

The YWTeen program is for 5th and 6th grade girls, ages 10-12. It is modeled on the nationally researched Girls Circle program, teaching girls how to consider actions and outcomes; how to treat people respectfully; how to become leaders; and how to formulate goals for their lives. At the leadership camps, girls receive input and mentoring from successful women from all walks of life. Mentoring teaches them that they, too, can become successful and make valuable contributions to their families, schools, and society.

Dr. Cardenas commented, “I delighted in interacting with the teens and hearing their positive ideas about being Americans.”


Shirley Selz, past president of AAUW, praised the girls' decision to continue to achieve in their education, careers, and lives.





**In The Heights: July 15 - Aug 21**


