AAUW MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Iconic Islander – Mary Jane Hamilton, Professor Emerita of Nursing, Texas A&M University—Corpus Christi

Congratulations, Professor Hamilton! For those of you who may not know Mary Jane well, she is a remarkable person—compassionate, smart, and dedicated to the field of nursing—a true professional. The latest edition of *The Islander Magazine* (Summer 2022, pp. 20-23) features Mary Jane as an “Iconic Islander.” Mary Jane received this title for her outstanding contributions to the university over 27 years. Professor Hamilton first came to the university in 1993 to head the Nursing Program, which, under her leadership, would become the College of Nursing and Health Sciences.

Receiving important awards for the nursing program, including a \$10 million grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), and inaugurating new programs, such as the eLine Military Program, designed to bring veterans with medical experience into the nursing field, Mary Jane became recognized nationally and internationally for her work. Her scholarship on HIV/AIDS symptom management research also brought professional acclaim. Even as Mary Jane advanced in administration and scholarship, she did not give up her teaching, reflecting her continuing dedication to the university’s prime mission.

Two quotations by Mary Jane, in the *Islander Magazine* article, are very moving. They help to fill out the story of how her devotion to people and her professional career align. The first is her description of her decision to become a nurse. “I was speaking to my grandmother about my decision to become a nurse and she asked me with great seriousness, ‘Can you hold an old woman’s hand while she’s dying?’ She reminded me that being a nurse is more than physically taking care of people, it’s being there for pivotal moments in their lives.”

The second quotation is Mary Jane’s response to the interviewer’s question, “How would you like to be remembered?” Mary Jane responded: “I hope others remember me as a strong, supportive, and encouraging mentor — someone who placed service to others above all else. I hope I am remembered as someone who embraced technology, encouraged increasing education, and was a strong advocate for nurses everywhere.”

Mary Jane, AAUW-Corpus Christi salutes you for all that you have accomplished as a nurse, scholar, administrator, and teacher, and for the loving person that you are. Your many years of faithful service make you an Icon indeed!

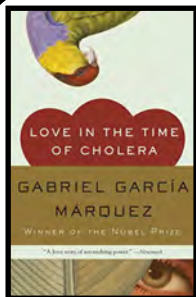
A Classics' Escape
