I have had my mind very much on the CDC Report on the Mental Health of Teen-Agers, that was released earlier this month. It seems that the negative effects of Covid isolation, family stress, and social media have created a crisis of sadness and anxiety for our girls. Bullying is rife on the internet, and many teenage girls have experienced violence and rape. Findings show that many teenage girls are struggling with depression.

AAUW is well positioned to help. While STEM programs, community outreach activities, and scholarships are important ways of opening the world to our young women and instilling in them a sense of self-worth and a recognition of their potential, we as individual also can offer our smiles, open conversations, and patience. We can encourage teenagers as we go through our days, especially those in our families, at our houses of worship, and while we volunteer in organizations, like the YWCA and the Garcia Center. Gestures of kindness let them know that they are valued. It is time to examine ourselves for the concrete ways that we can help our young female friends thrive in a very difficult environment.

A final reminder that voting on the proposed AAUW National Bylaw Amendments begins on April 5 and ends for online voting at 5:00 pm ET on May 15th. I hope that you will vote and make your voice and our branch's collective voice heard.

Teran has worked for the university since 2000, beginning as a secretary and advancing positions over time as she advanced her own education. She now has completed a Bachelor of Business Administration, a Master of Science in Counseling, and a Master of Business Administration from Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi. She has four adult children and eight grandchildren.

Antonio E. Garcia Arts & Education Center

The center is named for Antonio Garcia, an American artist nicknamed the “Michelangelo of South Texas,” whose career spanned the 1930s through the 1970s. His work received state and national recognition. Although he worked in various media, he may be best known for his frescoes, which adorn several South Texas churches. He taught at Del Mar College for more than 25 years.

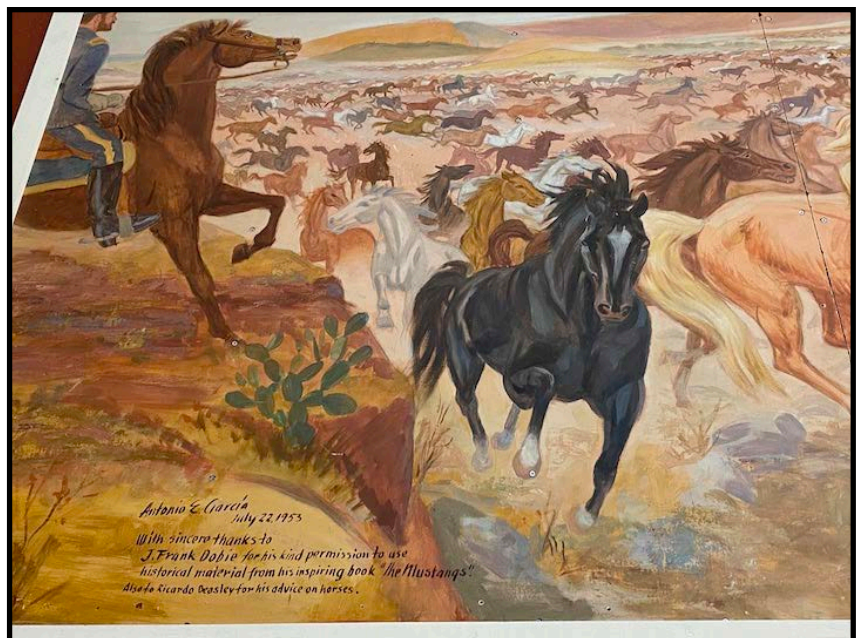
The Center opened in 1993 as the Center for Hispanic Arts with the mission of showcasing works by Hispanic artists and bringing art to the West Side Community. It became part of the Art Museum of South Texas in 1997 and was dedicated as the Antonio E. Garcia Arts and Education Center. In 2004 the A&M-Corpus Christi College of Education and Human Development assumed responsibility for the center, adding educational and counseling programming to the arts programming.

Directions to the Garcia Center:

From the Southside: Take the Crosstown Expressway (HWY 286) toward I-37. Take the Agnes/Laredo Street exit and stay on the Access Road (16th Street) through the Agnes Street intersection (it is one-way the wrong direction). Turn left on Laredo Street and go under the freeway, continuing to 18th Street where you will turn left. Then turn left onto Agnes. The center, which has a red brick front, will be on your right. It has a large parking lot.

From the Ocean Drive side of town: Take Staples through Six Points and turn left at Laredo Street. Continue on Laredo to 18th Street (you will cross under the freeway). Turn left on 18th Street and left on Agnes Street. The center, which has a red brick front, will be on your right. It has a large parking lot.

My Valentine Experience at the Garcia Center

On February 14th, Director Esmeralda Teran greeted me warmly in the lobby of the Antonio E. Garcia Center when I arrived to deliver chocolates and valentines for the children. Twenty students were gathered at round tables in the ample art studio, comfortably talking and laughing with each other. A small girl with a large, red bow pulled a pink backpack to a table where children of various ages joyfully showed off their valentine candy. Tutors greeted each child by his/her name and then announced that the art instructor would teach them to make valentines for their parents and siblings. Most of the children moved excitedly into the art workshop to long tables full of art

supplies while several tutors remained in the studio to provide one-to-one literacy instruction to three children. Along with individualized instruction, the competent, experienced tutors engaged everyone in reading and math lessons. The tutors, with expertise in early childhood, reading, and bilingual literacy, demonstrated a caring, dedicated focus on the children. The center is a safe, nurturing, and joyful setting that celebrates Garcia's legacy by integrating arts, literacy education, and individual growth and welfare into everyday learning and discovery. Because of my experience living on the West Side behind the old Memorial Hospital as a child and my experience as an educator, I laud the commitment of the Garcia Center to the well-being of the children in the area.
