Becoming a Volunteer Voter Deputy Registrar

At our April 5, 2025, branch meeting, Peggy Duran, a member of AAUW since 1996, engaged 26 fellow members in an account of her involvement as a member of the League of Women Voters for over 40 years. Peggy joined the League of Women Voters in 1980 after she and her husband, Dr. Jose Miguel Duran, a gastroenterologist, moved to Corpus Christi from Illinois. She realized that she did not know half of the candidates running in that year's election. Also, she noted that, in contrast to Texas, judgeships are not elected positions in Illinois. As an active member of the League Peggy has served for many years as a Volunteer Deputy Voter Registrar, an important role to educate citizens about voting as an *essential* function of democracy and the necessity of their participation and their right to vote to protect their democracy. To our interested group Peggy explained the process for becoming a Volunteer Deputy Voter Registrar.

Peggy is a graduate of what-is-now Dominican University, where she received a BA degree in Spanish, and she is a graduate of Loyola University in Chicago, Illinois, where she earned her master's in Bilingual Education. She taught for seven years in the Chicago Public School System. After moving to Corpus Christi, Peggy leaped into her second career as a medical office administrator in the office of her husband. She has assisted with patient histories and records for the past 35 years. When she spoke to patients, she asked them if they were registered to vote. Dismally, many reported not being registered, or never having voted, or having no interest or confidence in voting because it does not change anything. What Peggy heard convinced her of the need to interact with potential voters—in the role as volunteer deputy voter registrar—to inform them about important issues and help them register.

To the audience Peggy described the process of becoming a volunteer deputy voter registrar. It begins at the Office of the County Clerk, Nueces County Courthouse, where the County Voter Registrar appoints volunteer voter registrars. Interested persons fill out applications. Then they receive training, at times in person, but now training is offered online by ZOOM. Peggy is able to distribute registration forms, review the forms, and accept the completed voter registration applications. Peggy told us where she has distributed applications and what local populations— such as university classes—she has visited.

Peggy's focus on the necessary participation of each voter was reinforced by the president of the National League of Voters, Ms. Dianna Wynn, seen in a video, "State of the League 2025". Ms. Wynn also noted that "voting rights are being challenged." Thus, voting by each person is necessary. Peggy noted that LWV and AAUW both embrace and promote similar platforms: to protect the rights of citizens. Several audience members shared accounts of their voting registration efforts at schools and churches. A suggestion was made: An AAUW member could pair up with a volunteer deputy voting registrar to visit other sites. A member asked if a list of volunteers could be created and made available to all members.

Peggy informed us of a city protest on this day, part of a national protest in Washington, D.C, and in all states and major areas. Also, she encouraged us to participate in a townhall meeting with our Congressman Michael McCloud on Thursday, April 17, 2025, by voicing opinions about important issues that affect us.

Peggy enthusiastically explained the role of volunteer deputy voter registrar—a central part of her identity as an engaged citizen whose goal is to preserve our democracy.

2025-2026 AAUW Membership Renewal

If you have been a member for more than three years, your renewal date for annual dues is the month of June each year. Membership dues can be paid by credit card online through the <u>AAUW website</u>. Click on "log in" at the top righthand corner to enter the Community Hub. If you renew online, be sure that you check the radio buttons to pay state and local dues in addition to national dues. (Here is a helpful hint: when the pop-up screen for branches appears, you will find TX-Corpus Christi about three-fourths of the way down the long list that is alphabetized by state.)

For members who prefer to pay in cash or by check, I will be collecting dues at the May 3 luncheon. Make your check payable to AAUW-CC. If you prefer, you can mail your check to my home address before June 30. Remember that national dues have increased by \$2, so your check should be for \$99 (or more, if you wish to include a donation). Check your Yearbook for my address (Vickie Natale).

If you joined AAUW in the past three years, your renewal date for membership dues is the month of the year in which you first joined. The national office sends renewal notices to everyone about a month prior to your renewal date and the month of your renewal date.

Recruiting potential new members? Be sure to let them know that the national office is still offering half-price on national dues for first-time members, so a new member will pay only \$62 for the first year.

A <u>registration form</u> for new members can be found on our <u>website</u>. Just let new members know they can cross out the \$99 on this form and fill in \$62 for the first year's dues.

Celebrating Successful Women AAUW State Event

AAUW Texas hosted a seminar on April 24, 2025, via Zoom to celebrate highly recognized, successful women. These women of distinction provided highlights of their careers, their challenges, and those who influenced them. The speakers included the following.

Captain Lauran Canatella pursued an aviation career after college, flying seaplanes, cargo, a commuter airline, and citation jets. Captain Canatella described her biggest challenge as trying to keep up with her aviation career while still having a family. She taught with simulators while her children were small. With a desire to work for a commercial airline, it took multiple airline interviews before she was hired by American Airlines. Captain Canatella talked about how women are frequently



evaluated more stringently than men. American Airlines hires more than 16,000 pilots, yet only 219 of them are female captains. In retirement, she mentors young people who are trying to become pilots, and she humbly stated that being an example for young women is her ultimate reward.

Laurie Bianco is the mayor of Dalworthington Gardens, a city whose name is a



portmanteau of the three anchor cities in the Texas metroplex surrounding it: Dallas, Fort Worth, and Arlington. She always knew she wanted to be a teacher. After graduation, she went to Italy on an invitation from a friend and decided she wanted to work there. It took several application attempts, but she finally gained a teaching position in Italy where she lived for seven years and became fluent in the language. Ms. Bianco met her husband there, and they returned to the states for his job. She describes herself as a "people pleaser" who was not previously a political activist. However, other city officials

convinced her to run for mayor, and she has been serving in that capacity for seven years. Mayor Bianco joked that no one gives you a book on how to be a mayor. She has found that the job is all about the relationships you form, which, as it turns out, she's pretty good at doing.

Celebrating Successful Women AAUW State Event

Dr. Pamela Wells is one of the most respected educators in Texas. She started as a classroom teacher in Spring Branch ISD. She rose through the ranks, becoming the Executive Director of Region 4 Education Service Center which represents 1.2 million students and 165,000 staff members. There are 20 Education Service Centers in Texas, and when she was hired for the position, she was one of only four female executive directors out of the 20 Centers. Dr. Wells noted that, sadly, there were only three female directors out of 20 when she retired. She maintains that women are good in leadership positions because they tend to be more collaborative and are better communicators.



It was such a treat to hear these women talk about their dynamic lives and the challenges they faced in their respective fields. Each woman has made an impact in her community and has opened doors for other young women to make further gains for women's equality. Attendees were honored to get to know a bit about these successful women.






Committee News
