Sybil Ludington's Revolutionary Ride

Let's get ready to celebrate Summer!

The months of June and July host Flag Day and Independence Day, both days to celebrate being an American and reflect on the many wonderful women who shaped our great country. Thanks to my friendly history buff, Deanne, here is a story of an amazing girl who most of us probably have never have heard of, but it's definitely a story to share with July 4 coming next month.

On the night of April 26, 1777, 16-year-old Sybil Ludington climbed onto her horse and set off on a mission: a 40-mile ride to muster local militia troops in response to a British attack on the town of Danbury, Connecticut. Riding all night through rain — and traveling twice the distance that Paul Revere rode during his famous midnight ride — Sybil returned home at dawn having given nearly the entire regiment of 400 Colonial troops the order to assemble. Following the battle, General George Washington personally thanked Sybil for her service and bravery. Although every American school child knows the story of Paul Revere — largely thanks to the famous poem by Henry Wadsworth Longfellow — unfortunately few are taught about Sybil Ludington's courageous feat.

In 1935, New York State erected a series of historic markers along her route, and a statue of her by renowned American sculptor Anna Hyatt Huntington was erected in Carmel, New York in 1961. In 1975, she was honored on a U.S. Bicentennial stamp that depicted her on her horse. And, since April 1979, runners have also challenged themselves with the Sybil Ludington 50K Run, an ultramarathon that approximates the route she traveled on her ride. While her midnight ride has never been given the same recognition as that of her famous contemporary, Sybil Ludington's place in history is now secure and her story is a powerful reminder of the many daring girls and women who served their country during the fight for independence.

In March, Shirley sent the board some documents about Women and Civil Rights, some of them straight out of the laws of Texas! What caught my attention most was the comment she made at the end of the message. "Here we are in 2025 when Diversity, Inclusion, and Equity have changed from shared goals to shameful. Go figure." So, I am sharing one of the "Shameful Articles" with you.

"Tea and Equality", an article about First Lady Lou Hoover including Jessie DePriest, wife of African American congressman Oscar DePriest, among the invitees to tea at the White House on June 12, 1929, and the controversy about including Mrs. DePriest.

Jesse DePriest was the wife of the only African American member of Congress and she received a handwritten invitation to socialize with the new first lady, Lou Henry Hoover. The article details how the White House had to walk back the "socialize" part of the invitation and state that it was an "official act." It further details how segregationists tried to block the swearing-in of Congressman DePriest but House Speaker Nicholas Longworth, who was married to the daughter of President Teddy Roosevelt, outmaneuvered them by swearing in all of the members at one time.

The article goes on to describe the chaos that ensues after the tea and, as you might imagine, is not very pleasant.

But in our branch, Diversity, Inclusion and Equity are still shared goals and I am going to ask for your help in achieving this goal. It is a goal of our branch, and one of my priorities, that we find a DEI Officer for our branch this year. So, I am asking if one of you is willing to serve in this new role and help us make this position a reality.

If you are interested, please let me know. I have the information on the roles and responsibilities and will pledge my support to you as you take on this initiative on behalf of our branch and AAUW.

Del Mar College STEM Camps to Engage West Oso Jr. High Girls' STEM Club in Summer 2025

Fourteen enthusiastic members of the West Oso Jr. High Girls' STEM Club marked the end of April by gathering after school with their STEM teacher, Beatrice Esquivel; Jennifer Gonzales, Chairperson of AAUW's STEM Committee, and Director of Career Development at Del Mar College; and speaker Dara Betz, Workforce Programs Director at Del Mar College.

Ms. Gonzales explained the purpose of the gathering—to increase the girls' understanding of the broad range of STEM careers and the opportunities available in terms of subject matter and skills. She introduced an accomplished speaker, Dara Betz, who began her professional career with the U. S. Army and for 35 years she trained in geospatial technologies. Her experiences connected with the National Science Foundation's focus on drones in air space. Ms. Betz stressed that her passion is connecting girls with STEM and encouraging their potential.



Del Mar College STEM Camps to Engage West Oso Jr. High Girls' STEM Club in Summer 2025

As Director of Workforce Programs at Del Mar College, Ms. Betz works with industry partners to achieve the success of the programs. For summer 2025 she obtained free summer camps for teens from city schools. In detail Ms. Betz called attention to 7 summer coding camps scheduled for July 2025. She described the activities of each day using the elementary coding camp as an example. On the first day students will be grouped in teams. Collaboratively, they will learn to use software to carry out a goal, and they will understand the necessity of team work and positive interactions. Ms. Betz explained a 2024 summer camp that introduced students to robotics and the exciting engagement of the "Ultimate Team Challenge." Teams competed against each other. Each team prepared for public presentations of their projects, demonstrating their knowledge, technical skills, and effective collaboration to family members and friends. These presentations were also competitions.

Summer 2025: The beginning camps will be offered from July 14- July 18. The advanced camps are scheduled for July 21- 25. Any girl who is interested in gaining a place in a camp will apply and also write an essay that explains why she would like to experience a STEM camp at Del Mar College.

Ms. Betz took time to ask each girl about her best school subject and career interest after graduation. Each girl was pleased to respond. In talking to them Ms. Betz recognized a girl who participated in a summer camp in 2024 and achieved much. Ms. Betz invited this girl to function as a mentor to students in a beginning camp in July 2025. The student eagerly described her positive experiences in her 2024 summer camp, her skills and achievements, and fun engagement with other.

Other participants included Nina Fischer, Outreach Specialist at DMC, an AAUW Member; and Diana Cardenas., both members of AAUW's STEM Committee.

West Oso STEM Students Tour Del Mar College Campus

Jennifer Gonzales, our Branch STEM committee chair, coordinated arrangements for STEM students from West Oso Middle School to tour the Del Mar College Oso Creek Campus on May 3, 2025. The tour introduced 15 girls who are in 6th, 7th, and 8th grades to three major programs at Del Mar College.

- Dr. Daisy Zhang an AAUW Branch member is a professor of biotechnology at Del Mar College. She named and demonstrated numerous pieces of equipment used in the biotechnology program, including incubators, sterilizers, centrifuges, microscopes, autoclaves, spectrophotometers, and high-performance liquid chromatographers (HPLC). The lab can perform PCR (polymerase chain reaction) tests that target specific DNA sequences for analyzing crime scene DNA. Dr. Zhang explained that different cell samples must be stored at four different levels of temperature. The students experienced one of these by walking into the cold storage room that is set at -20°. Dr. Zhang also emphasized that both hard skills (lab work) and soft skills (including writing) are critical to science programs, and she encouraged the girls to continue to do their best in school if they are interested in a STEM program.
- Nelda Sanchez, an advisor at Del Mar College, introduced students to the architectural, drafting technology, and construction management programs. She talked about the variety of jobs in these programs, including commercial, housing, and military applications. Above all, safety is imperative, and buildings must be built to withstand hurricanes and floods, especially for this area. The students viewed 3-D imaging equipment and 3-D printers as well as sample products made by the DMC architectural and drafting students.
- Lisa Pollakis, professor and program director, spoke to the girls about the culinary and hospitality management programs. The students toured the variety of commercial baking and cooking facilities, each designed specifically for different types of baking and cooking. Ms. Pollakis stressed that math is involved in culinary arts, including measurements in recipes, temperatures, speed, and cost analyses. She also stressed that cleaning is essential in this business and talked about different temperatures needed for washing, rinsing, and sanitizing.

The students were very attentive to each speaker. When asked at the conclusion of the presentations what interested them most, some students talked about the biotechnology program, while others spoke about the architecture program or the culinary arts program, illustrating the positive aspect of showcasing multiple career options to young students.

We thank the speakers who demonstrate examples of successful female role models in STEM programs, and we thank Beatrice Esquivel, STEM Coordinator at West Oso Middle School, who chaperoned the students and worked with Jennifer Gonzales on the arrangements. Also attending the event was Branch member Dr. Vickie Natale.
