

Speaker: Dr. Kelly Bezio, Associate Professor of English at Texas A&M University- Corpus Christi

Program: Presentation on the book The Uninhabitable Earth: Life After Warming by David Wallace-Wells

What is the best way to tell the story of climate change? David Wallace-Wells's 2019 non-fiction book *The Uninhabitable Earth: Life After Warming* explores the consequences of global warming, asking us how we can narrate looming catastrophe in such a way as to encourage action. This presentation will examine how Wallace-Wells and others recount world-wide environmental change and what we can do about it.





Kelly L. Bezio is a Professor of English at Texas A&M University - Corpus Christi. Her interdisciplinary scholarship foregrounds how insights from the past help us understand how to combat inequity in our present moment. Her intellectual commitments privilege convergent collaborations across disciplines that address how knowledge making is related to the most pressing issues society faces—and how to solve them. She holds a Ph.D. and a M.A. in English from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and a B.A. in English, History, and French, with a minor in German, from the University of Wisconsin - Oshkosh.

October Branch Meeting Speaker Summary

The featured speaker for the October meeting was Dr. Juan Carlos Huerta who presented research on Latino voting preferences. He was warmly received by an audience of 27 members in attendance. Dr. Huerta was asked to speak to our group to celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month. Our membership was duly impressed and gave a very enthusiastic response to know that he is the first Hispanic to be named as a Regents Professor for the Texas A&M University System.

Dr. Juan Carlos Huerta is Regents Professor of Political Science at Texas A&M University—Corpus Christi. Dr. Huerta is active in promoting teaching and learning in p olitical science and higher education, receiving the Lifetime Achievement Award from the Political Science Education Section of the American Political Science Association (APSA) and the Outstanding Learning Community Advocate Award from the National Learning Communities Association (NLCA). In addition, he served as president of the Political Science Education Section, Southwestern Political Science Association, Vice President of the APSA, and founding president of the NLCA.

His research examines political representation, public opinion, Latino/a politics, political science education, and learning communities. He is a co-author of the widely used textbook *Practicing Texas Politics* and has publications in venues including *Social Science Quarterly* and the *Journal of Political Science Education*. His current research examines predictors of Latino/a party identification. Dr. Huerta is a frequent commentator on Texas politics for local, state, national, and international news organizations. He earned his Ph.D. in political science from the University of Houston.

Changing demographics in Texas have led to speculation about the impact on party competition in Texas. Of particular interest is the impact of a growing Latino/a population in Texas and how this will affect party identification and voting preferences. In southwestern states, with growing Latino/a populations, this has led to Democrats becoming more competitive. Florida also has a growing Latino/a population, and Republicans have become dominant in what had been a competitive state.

October Branch Meeting Speaker Summary

Will a growing Latino/a population in Texas lead to Democrats becoming more competitive, such as in New Mexico, Colorado, Arizona, and Nevada; or will Texas follow a path like Florida with a growing Latino/a population that has led to Republican dominance? The presentation will examine public opinion polls to provide some clues about the future of party competition in Texas and implications for Latino/a voting preferences.

Some of the predictors presented that may lead to a shift in identifying with the Republican party (realignment) include:

Protestantism - higher number of Latinos are identifying as Protestant

Rural vs. Urban voters – rural voters tend to identify as Republicans

Attitudes regarding women – may be a "machismo" effect

Strong on border security and pro-police

Born before 1980 – older age groups trend more conservative

Economic voting – vote with your pocketbook

Mobilization of voters – Republican party courted and mobilized Latino voters

Some of the questions from our members included the effects on voting for people moving to Texas from California. Dr. Huerta indicated it would be difficult to predict that effect since Texas has many barriers such as high costs to register to vote and low voter turnout. Mail-in ballots produce higher voter turnout. Finally, it is the party's responsibility to mobilize voters through grassroots efforts.

Dr. Huerta was also asked about the role of the Protestant Megachurches in influencing elections. He indicated that the sample size from the data set he used was too small to conduct any type of probability testing at this time. Probability renders statistical significance which would provide evidence for any findings.



- Small, working string lights (optional)


