President's Message

The theme of the meeting was centered around stars, four to be exact! As you read through the newsletter you will learn more about all your hard work and the fantastic results we achieved. You will also read about all of the incredible activities that were happening while we were taking a break from our regular meetings. It's always fun, and a little tiring, keeping up with all of you.

I have a few requests for members to prepare for the October meeting. There are two outstanding items that need to be voted on during the meeting. The first is the annual budget for 2025-2026. This information can be found in the Yearbook that was sent out recently.

The second is some proposed changes to our Bylaws and Policies that will need to be voted on as well.

A change is proposed to Article XII, Section 1 to change the wording regarding timing of delivery to membership. Current wording references publishing the list of nominees for officers in the newsletter but that doesn't always fit with the two-week timeline. The Board recommends the wording is altered to state the list of nominees shall be delivered to the membership at least two weeks before the April meeting. This will give us the flexibility to send out the notification according to the Bylaws but not limit us to putting in the newsletter.

The second proposed change is to the Policies in the Finance section. We are proposing adding language that will require the bank to maintain a six-month operational balance in the bank account, unless the Board approves a variance.

We will review and vote on the budget and proposed changes at the meeting.

I hope to see you in October. Maybe the weather will feel more like Fall by then.

Speaker: Dr. Carlos Huerta, Regents Professor of Political Science, Texas A&M - Corpus Christi

Program: Latino Voting Patterns in the 2024 Elections - Culture, Assimilation, and Gender



Dr. Huerta joined Texas A&M University - Corpus Christi in 1995 as a professor. In these 30 years, he has contributed significantly by teaching, researching, publishing, and contributing to the community. He is an advocate for teaching and learning in higher education.

In April 2025, Texas A&M University - Corpus Christi celebrated Dr. Huerta for being named the Texas A&M University System's Regents Professor.

Dr. Huerta's research is primarily focused on public opinion, Texas politics, and Latino politics. He is also an author. He has co-authored the last several editions of "Practicing Texas Politics," a popular textbook used at colleges and universities state-wide. Huerta has also written several book chapters and journal articles. His classes are popular among political science majors and non-majors alike.

She and her husband, David, have two children and four grandchildren.




Celebrating 105 Years of Women's Votes

AAUW members were among the more than 150 diners at the 105th Women's Equality Day presented by the local League of Women Voters of Corpus Christi on August 26 at the Holiday Inn Airport. Fellowship, food, and shared goals, combined with an inspiring keynote speech, again confirmed the power of women to impact the quality of life for everyone. A very extensive silent auction provided significant funding for LWV's nonpartisan voter guide – a very important publication to inform the public about candidates and other issues on the local ballot.

The printed agenda and program provided a timely reminder that the 19 th Amendment to the United States Constitution was officially adopted exactly 105 years ago, on August 26, 1920. The program noted that the amendment did not become official, even though ratified, until it was signed by Secretary of State Bainbridge Colby. Article V of the Constitution requires the approval of three-fourths of the states for a proposed amendment to be adopted. Secretary Colby received the certified record of the action of the Tennessee legislature, the 36 th state to ratify the amendment, on August 26, which he promptly signed. The goal of women's right to vote had traveled a very long road starting with the Seneca Falls Convention in 1848, finally overcoming extreme opposition along the way. Unfortunately, some current citizens believe that the amendment should be repealed but with the dedication of the League, AAUW, and multiple other groups and individuals, we trust any such effort at repeal will never succeed. Women's work is never done...

Alice Upshaw Hawkins, President of LWV since 2023, chaired the meeting. Sandra Sterba-Boatwright, Treasurer of LWV and new member of the AAUW Corpus Christi branch, introduced the speaker, Janis Richardson.







Celebrating 105 Years of Women's Votes

Ms. Richardson's topic "Breaking the Jello Mold: What it Takes to Be a League in Rural Texas" formed the framework for relating her journey from retirement as Executive Director of Grassroots Grantmakers (small grants program for volunteer-led neighborhood groups), return from Tennessee to her home state of Texas, and refocusing her energies on her commitment to democracy and local participation. Starting small with just four friends, she founded the League of Women Voters of Lavaca County. She believed in the goals of registering, voting, and educating the local community.

Addressing the LWV goal of registering citizens to vote, Ms. Richardson learned that 85% of the local citizenry was already registered. Effective pursuit of LWV goals inspired the Lavaca group to reach beyond the county borders. The group grew to include five surrounding counties and now includes 80 members, proud to be the League of Women Voters of South Central Texas. Ms. Richardson serves as Secretary of LWVTX and President of LWVSCTX.

Ms. Richardson advised collaborating with like-minded friends to pursue an important goal; be dedicated; believe the work is important; be bold; and gain self-confidence from working with each other. As an energetic leader, she congratulated the local LWV leaders for their important work in Corpus Christi and inspired everyone to remain dedicated to service.

County Judge and Museum President Joe Benavides welcomed the attendees.




Through lively discussion, the other readers contributed their ideas and impressions of the meaning of his search and dreams.

The AAUW Texas Branch awarded 14 SHARE Scholarships for students from 5 colleges to attend the 2025 National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL). NCCWSL is now being coordinated by NASPA – Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education. The students were chosen by their Academic Advisors and were accompanied to the conference by Michele Taylor and Glenda Higgins who are members of the West Harris County Branch. It was a pleasant experience to spend time with and get to know such a diverse group of young ladies from Texas A&M University, Texas Southern University, Texas Wesleyan University, Prairie View A&M University, and Del Mar College. I was honored to present a session on the Importance of Mentoring, and it was an actual presentation of Mentor/Mentee relationship. I invited four students (Alexandra Bennett, Katherine Hernandez, Kerianna Chambers and Kenadi Walker) to assist in making the session come alive by being my co-presenters.

The NCCWSL Conference was very inspiring, and the students were mature and professional throughout the weekend. The students came away from the conference with increased confidence, motivation, knowledge, and inspiration to embark upon new opportunities that will enhance their future careers. The students submitted reports expressing the impact the conference had on their outlook for personal and professional life. Below are excerpts from each student's report that conveys their experiences.




