AAUW December Luncheon



November Branch Meeting Speaker Summary

The featured speaker for the November meeting was Dr. Kelly Bezio from Texas A&M University – Corpus Christi who presented a very engaging and salient review of climate change based on a book entitled *The Uninhabitable Earth* by David Wallace – Wells. Dr. Bezio received a very warm welcome from the 21 members attending the meeting, held at the YWCA.

Dr. Kelly L. Bezio is Professor English at Texas A&M University – Corpus Christi. Her interdisciplinary scholarship foregrounds how insights from the past help us understand how to combat inequity in our present moment. Her intellectual commitments privilege convergent collaborations across disciplines that address how knowledge making is related to the most pressing issues society faces—and how to solve them. Her book-length study, *In Contagion's Wake: Black Writers and the Development of Modern Outbreak Narratives* is forthcoming from University of Massachusetts Press in 2026. Her work on quarantine, inoculation, pandemic teaching, medical secularity, and pastoral racism has appeared in journals such as *American Literature, Pedagogy, Symbiosis, Digital Defoe, The Eighteenth Century: Theory and Interpretation, Literature and Medicine*, and *Studies in Religion*. She has served as guest co-editor of special issues on the topic of religion and medicine in the latter two journals. She holds a Ph.D. and M.A. in English from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and a B.A. in English, History, and French, with a minor in German, from the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh.

For this presentation, Dr. Bezio addresses the question: What is the best way to tell the story of climate change? David Wallace-Well's 2019 non-fiction book *The Uninhabitable Earth* explores the consequences of global warming, asking how we can narrate looming catastrophe in such a way as to encourage action. This presentation will examine how Wallace-Wells and others recount world-wide environmental change and what we can do about it.



November Branch Meeting Speaker Summary

Her presentation examines some of the critical issues on climate change based on the journalistic accounting of the author Wallace-Wells using his research based on scientific findings. He issued a call to action to try to reduce some of the environmental damage caused by mankind, especially carbon dioxide (car tailpipes emissions, fossil fuel smokestack effluents). He asserts that we, as a community, can take steps to change the warming of the planet if we act as a community. He also offers some solutions that could help alleviate the greenhouse effect, such as regulatory and policy change as well as the use of technology for carbon capture.

Dr. Bezio engaged our members who eagerly answered some of the questions proposed during this interactive presentation. Some of the video clips such as *An Inconvenient Truth* and *Your Climate Story* brought these issues home. Her presentation was easy to follow and very well accepted. I received incredibly positive feedback on this presentation.
